Civil Rights Itinerary

Rosa Parks Museum – 252 Montgomery Street

Experience the energy and emotion of the Montgomery Bus Boycott at this museum, which features a recreated street scene and reenactment on the bus with video footage that transports witnesses to the fateful day on December 1, 1955.

Civil Rights Memorial and Center – 400 Washington Avenue

This center honors the achievements and memory of those who lost their lives during the Civil Rights Movement and serves as a vehicle for education and reflection on the struggle for equality.

Dexter Avenue King Memorial Baptist Church – 454 Dexter Avenue – Friday and Saturday or by appointment only – Dexter Parsonage Museum

In this National Historic Landmark see the modest pulpit where Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. first preached his message of hope and brotherhood.

A monument honoring the *Mothers of Gynecology* stands in Montgomery, not far from where the procedures took place and roughly a mile from where a statue of J. Marion Sims, “the father of gynecology” who experimented on the women, still stands in front of the Alabama State Capitol.

Freedom Rides Museum – 210 South Court Street

Freedom Riders, black and white, male and female, none of them older than 22, stepped off a bus at the Montgomery Greyhound Station on May 20, 1961. They were prepared to meet mob violence with non-violence and courage. They prepared farewell letters and wills. Their goal was to help end racial segregation in public transportation. And they did.
